


RUBY'S REPAIR CAFE

EDUCATIONAL APPLICABILITY

Ruby's Repair Cafe is a topical story about fixing things. This book offers a crucial starting point for children to talk about sustainability and learning about it can be lots of fun. Thinking about getting something fixed instead of throwing it away is a positive way we can all contribute with our actions every single day. Key themes are sustainability, friendship and community.

DISCUSSION TOPICS

Before, during and after reading the book

- 1. Introduce *Ruby's Repair Cafe* to the children and ask them what they think the story might be about.
- 2. Name some of the things that Ruby fixes. Have you ever had anything fixed? Do you think it's better to buy something new or have the broken item fixed?
- 3. Why do you think people go to Biggs Department Store instead of Ruby's Repair Cafe?
- 4. Why does the dump get bigger and bigger?
- 5. What happens to the department store after the storm?
- 6. What does Ruby suggest doing? How does she involve everybody? What do they all do?
- 7. What is the new department in Biggs Department Store?
- 8. After reading the book, ask them what they thought of the story. Which was their favourite part and why?





Can you help Brock get his clock repaired?










SOLUTION TO THE MAZE
