

In this stunning picture book, by award-winning creators – Vikki Conley and Martina Heiduczek – we journey with Salim as he grows up, creating a new life around himself.

This is a story about a journey, hope and creating fun with the little that you have. It is also a book that explores home and place, as well as how stories and play can help us cope and heal during difficult times.

EDUCATIONAL APPLICABILITY

BOOK MOTIVATION by the author

During my 10 years working for the international aid agency, World Vision, I met many children with extraordinary stories. Across Africa, children and their families shared their experiences with me about leaving home, fleeing conflict or being forced to travel away to find enough food or work to survive.

For many of these children, play became something that helped them heal and become happy again. In Africa, I saw children make balls out of plastic bags and string, and toy trucks out of clay and sticks. One girl had a beloved pet beetle, with shiny green wings.

In post-tsunami Sri Lanka, where homes were washed away and destroyed, one of the first things that World Vision rebuilt while I was there, were the playgrounds. Here children and families could have a place to play, laugh and reconnect. Safe play spaces were also created for children to come each day, while the schools were being rebuilt.

I wrote this story to explore the many challenges that our world presents for our children. We all have different homes and places where we live (cities, towns, villages), but for some children they are forced to leave for different reasons, and that can be hard.

In places like Australia, America, Canada, New Zealand and the UK, we are fortunate to have relatively safe homes and towns to live, a roof over our heads and a school to go to. Many children, in poor and unsettled regions of Africa and the Middle East may not even have a proper home. Some refugees may live in a shelter like a tent in another country or region away from their home, for many months or years. Can you imagine being born in a refugee camp and living there for most of your life?

But the joy of being surrounded by people who love us, who welcome us and share and give, is something that is appreciated universally – something that connects us all. The character Zada represents this notion.



WRITING STYLE by the author

Under The Red Shawl is a lyrical, heart-felt narrative written in prose, with frequent use of figurative language and the 'show don't tell' writing technique.

When writing *Under The Red Shawl*, I wanted the words of the story to draw readers into Salim's life, so they could imagine the journey using all of their senses. I deliberately used the 'show don't tell' writing technique heavily through the story so readers could see, feel and sense the snow, dust and heat of the extreme environments.

Carefully selected verbs, such as nipped, folded and hung, all helped to create an evocative text that would build empathy and allow the reader to pause and consider what each instance might feel like. I also love using figurative language, which helps further engage readers, allowing children to 'feel and see' the story.


Inspired by my own memories, *Under The Red Shawl* is a good example of how writing about personal experiences can result in authentic and powerful narratives. I always encourage students to use their memories to inspire their story writing.

Symbolism is something that is fun to use in narrative writing. I wanted the red shawl to represent the connection, strength and love of the mother-child bond, and the comfort that this offers, particularly difficult times.

I aimed to craft an accessible text (for children, parents and teachers) that would spark conversations about home, place, connection and inclusion. The story's themes can be explored on a variety of levels appropriate for preschoolers up to middle primary, even secondary students.

DISCUSSION TOPICS

Before, during and after reading the book

1. Introduce *Under the Red Shawl* to the children and ask them what they think the story might be about.
2. Mama says to Salim that they'll find another place – a safer place. What does this mean?
3. Mama wants Salim to feel safe despite their difficult situation. What does 'Mama wrapped him like a cocoon' mean?
4. Salim makes shadow puppets. Have you ever made them?
5. Why do you think Mama and Salim have to create a new story? What do you think happened to them previously?
6. Who is Zada? How does she behave towards Mama and Salim? What does she teach Mama to do? Do you know someone like Zada?
7. Zada gives Salim a gift of a book. Salim wraps it like a baby. What does this mean? Salim has never seen a book before. Can you imagine or remember seeing a book for the first time ever?
8. Discuss all the different ways that Mama and Salim use the red shawl? Why has the author used the red shawl like this in the story?
9. After reading the book, ask them what did they think of the story? Which was their favourite part and why?



Everyone was leaving town on the day that Salim was born. Mama folded him into her shawl and started walking amid the dust and colour.

Salim listened to the boom, boom, boom of Mama's heart.

'We'll find another place,' said Mama. 'A safer place.'



EXTRA CLASSROOM ACTIVITIES

ENGLISH

Grammar

Search for the verbs (action words) and adjectives (describing words) within the story of *Under The Red Shawl*. Then write the nouns, verbs and adjectives in different colours for two sentences in the book.

Figurative language

There are a few examples of similes in the story. Try and find them all! Can you create one of your own?

'Show don't tell' writing technique

There are many examples of this technique in the story. Can you spot them? Now try to practise this technique for two of your own sentences.


Narrative writing

Have you ever had to move home? Have you been homesick? Have you been camping before or had a sleep over at someone's house for the first time? Try writing a story about this.

When the days were hot, Salim shaped clay into trucks and balls. He rolled them over his legs. He rolled them over Mama's arms. He rolled them over Donkey.



'We'll have to create a new story in this new place,' said Mama.



GEOGRAPHY

Where do you think this story might be set? Pick a country/region that you feel might be similar to the one in *Under The Red Shawl*. Research what homes are like for children in these countries, how do they go to school, can they get things like clean water and food easily? Try countries in Africa, the Middle East, Latin America and Asia.


Listen to some music or learn a dance from one of the countries/regions where you think the story might be set. You could even cook a meal from one of the regions you saw in the story.

A-MAZE-ING JOURNEY


Help Salim, Mama and Donkey find their way to Zada.
